


Fig. 1. Bronze Armlet, found at Stanhope. (3.)

(1) By Sir Graham G. Montgomery, Bart., F.S.A. Scot.

Massive Armlet of bronze, of "Late Celtic" character (fig. 1), $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in greatest diameter internally and 3 inches in breadth across the

middle, where it is narrowest, widening to $4\frac{1}{8}$ inches across each of the expanded extremities. These have each a circular opening, $1\frac{3}{8}$ inches diameter, which, as in the case of the Castle Newe and Pitkelloney Armlets (*Proceedings*, vol. xv. pp. 330 and 342), seem to have been filled with enamelled plaques, now gone.

The weight of the armlet is $30\frac{3}{4}$ ounces avoirdupois. It was found, in 1876, along with the three following articles, in a hollow near the top of the hill above the farm-house of Stanhope, by Mr Lindsay, the tenant of the farm.




Fig. 2. Mounting of bronze, found at Stanhope. (2.)

Two circular Harness Mountings of bronze (fig. 2), each with a projection at one side, one being $2\frac{1}{2}$ and the other $2\frac{3}{4}$ inches in greatest diameter. A loop of metal projects from the back of each, opposite to the square projecting part, as if for attachment.

Patella of bronze, of Roman character, 6 inches in breadth across the top, $3\frac{7}{8}$ inches in depth, and $3\frac{3}{4}$ inches across the bottom, which displays a series of four projecting concentric rings. The handle is of the usual

form, with a perforation in the circular expansion at the terminal extremity. [See the *Proceedings*, vol. xv. pp. 316-322.]

Vase, with brown glaze, $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches high, with twisted handles at the sides, from Hangchow, China.

Disc of splint coal, $3\frac{5}{8}$ inches in diameter by $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in greatest thickness, imperfect on one face at one side, and having in the centre a rudely made perforation, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter.

Disc of bituminous shale, rather irregularly shaped, $5\frac{7}{8}$ inches in the longest and $5\frac{1}{8}$ inches in the shortest diameter, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in thickness, having in the centre a rudely made perforation $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches in diameter, worked from both faces.

Oblong rectangular piece of bituminous shale, 7 inches long, $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches broad, and 1 inch thick, with a rudely made perforation in the centre 2 inches in diameter, and worked from both faces.

Oval-shaped Pebble of greywacke, $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length by 3 inches in breadth, with a small, irregularly shaped hole pecked from each face near one end,—probably a sinkstone.

Discoid Pebble of greenstone, $4\frac{3}{4}$ inches in length by $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in breadth, with a small perforation near one end,—probably a sinkstone.

Oval Pebble of greenstone, $3\frac{1}{8}$ inches in length by $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches in breadth and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches in thickness, having a rudely made shallow groove all round in the direction of its greatest length,—probably a sinkstone.

These were all found in the course of excavations at Windmillcroft Dock, Glasgow, as described by Mr Bennie in a paper on the Clyde Gravels in the *Transactions of the Geological Society of Glasgow*, vol. ii. p. 114.

Oblong rectangular shallow basket, 18 inches by 14 inches, lined with white satin, given by Mrs Scott, in 1808, to Mrs Roger Aytoun, as the baby-basket used in the infancy of Sir Walter Scott.
