VIII.—Letter from Thomas Robertson, Esq. to the Earl of Buchan, respecting the discovery of a Stone Coffin at Arbroath, supposed to contain the Remains of King William the Lyon.

[Read, 10th November 1818.]

7, Maitland Street, 26th Oct. 1816.

My Lord,

Lordship is no doubt acquainted, that the remains of King William the Lyon were interred at a certain spot within the Abbey of Arbroath, of which he was the Founder. A few weeks ago, the workmen employed under the direction of the Barons of Exchequer in executing some repairs, &c. about the Abbey, discovered, at the place where his Majesty is said to have been buried, a Stone Coffin, the lid or upper part of it having (among other devices) the figure of a lion on it, from which, and other circumstances, the coffin was supposed to contain the King's remains. The bones found in it were in a tolerably good state of preservation. The tooth which I gave your Lordship two days ago was extracted from the scull found in the coffin, and was given to me by a person of

respectability, on the spot, who had an opportunity of ascertaining the truth of it. I give his account of the tooth at your Lordship's desire; and am,
