Meetings

The Anniversary Meeting was held on 30th November 1962. Monthly meetings then continued until April 1963 and were resumed in October 1963.

Inchtuthil Report. The usual extra meeting was held on 22nd March 1963 for Professor Richmond's report on the progress of the Inchtuthil excavations.

Rhind Lectures. The Rhind Lectures for 1963-4 will be given on 18th, 19th, 20th, 23rd, 24th and 25th March 1964 by Mr D. F. Allen, B.A., F.B.A., F.S.A., on 'The Coins of the Ancient Celts'.

Administration

Centenary. Our only remaining Lady Associate, Dr M. A. Murray, celebrated her 100th birthday on 13th July 1963. The Council sent her a letter on behalf of the Society congratulating her on the event. It was with great sorrow that we read of her death recently.

Abstract of Accounts. In order to save expense on printing and postage, an Abstract of the Treasurer's Annual Account is exhibited for inspection by Fellows in the library. The circulation of copies to individual Fellows has been discontinued.

Editor's Report 1962-3

Volume XCIV of Proceedings, which included a List of Fellows, was published in September, an improvement of two months over last year. Council acknowledges with thanks grants made towards the publication of papers by H.M. Treasury (for the Royal Commission on Ancient and Historical Monuments), the East Lothian County Council, the Council for British Archaeology and the Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland.

One paper for Volume XCV, for which a grant has been promised, has been delayed,

but the remainder has been sent to the printers and publication is expected in the summer of 1964. This will be similar in size to Volume XCIV, but in the interests of economy the Rules of the Society and other introductory matter have been omitted.

Material already exists for Volume XCVI.

Chalmers-Jervise Prize. The competition for the Chalmers-Jervise Prize was advertised to the public through the newspapers on 1st March 1963. The closing date for entries was 31st October, by which time a number of entries had been received. Judges are being appointed and the results will be announced in due course.

The Meeting at Glasgow University for the formation of a Trust for the establishment of a folk museum at the township of Auchindrain in Argyll.

The Rt. Hon. The Earl of Haddington, K.T., M.C., T.D., LL.D., was re-elected as the Society's Representative on the Board of Trustees for the National Museum of Antiquities of Scotland.

Sale of Publications of the Society. A Catalogue of the Publications of the Society was produced early in the year and was sent out to all interested. The demand for both offprints and back copies of Proceedings has been considerable and sales during the year have amounted to $\pounds 421$ 15s. 3d. Although the supply of some items has been exhausted, there are still large stocks held which are available for sale.

This Report was unanimously approved on the motion of Mr Grant G. Simpson, seconded by Mr George Murray, M.A.

The President spoke of the state of the Society which he said was very healthy. The public was showing an increasing interest in antiquities and he encouraged all present to urge others to join the Society. The costs of publications were rising and in particular the prices of well-produced works of reference were often beyond the reach of the ordinary private person. The Proceedings of this Society still gave remarkably good value and was

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an authoritative and well produced work of reference. He repeated the warning that he gave last year that it was inevitable that the rate of annual subscriptions would have to be increased in the near future; the situation was still critical and the Council was now considering the best means of carrying this out.

The Treasurer then made a Statement regarding the funds of the Society for 1962-3, and read the Auditor's docquet. The Accounts were unanimously approved on the motion of Mr A. Kennedy seconded by Mr L. Grahame MacDougall, A.R.S.A., A.R.I.B.A., F.R.I.A.S.

The following Communication was then read:

SIR DANIEL WILSON: FATHER OF SCOTTISH ARCHAEOLOGY, by W. Douglas Simpson, C.B.E., M.A., D.LITT., LL.D., F.S.A., F.S.A.SCOT.

Mr William H. Valentine, a grand nephew of Sir Daniel Wilson, then spoke about a silver tea-set presented to Sir Daniel Wilson by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland. He had brought with him the silver tray belonging to the tea-set, which he put on view during the Meeting. Mr Valentine stated that he had presented the tea-set to the University of Toronto, of which Sir Daniel Wilson became Principal, with the exception of the silver tray, which he had retained for use by his family.

At the conclusion of the Meeting, sherry was served to Fellows and friends.
