NOTICE OF RECENT FINDS OF COINS IN SCOTLAND.

Cleuchhead, Roxburghshire. — The following coins were turned up on the 24th November 1897 while ploughing a field on the farm of Cleuchhead, on the Wolfelee estate, Jedburgh. They were found about 6 inches below the surface in the Hill End Field, at a spot 17 yards from the Hill End Plantation and 100 yards from the "Old Roman Road." The coins, as examined by me, numbered 138, and were nearly all foreign deniers.
