(2) Two flint implements from Carcant, Heriot. By Mrs Clark, Nithlea, Hawick.

(5) Axe of pale green tuff, length 5.9 in., found on Boughtknowes Farm, Bathgate. By Mrs Marion Hill, Boughtknowes Farm, Bathgate.

(6) Axe of dark green tuff, length 3.85 in., found on Craigs Farm, nr. Bathgate. By Wm. Bryson, Swineabbey, Whitburn.

(7) Axe of dark igneous rock, length 4.24 in., found on Cornhill Farm. By John V. Lindsay, Cornhill, Cornhill-on-Tweed.

(8) Axe of yellowish-grey tuff, length 3.65 in., found on Ferrygate Farm, Dirleton; and part of an unfinished upper quernstone of red breccia, early iron age in character, found about 200 yards N.W. of North Berwick Gas Works, on Ferrygate Farm. By the finder, J. T. Inglis, Ferrygate, Dirleton, through J. S. Richardson, LL.D., F.S.A.Scot.

(9) Ball of black crystalline rock, diam. 2.75 in., carved into four large low knobs. Found many years ago by the donor's sons at the broken edge of a cliff at the S. extremity of Benbecula, Outer Hebrides. By the late Dr Eric Gardner, F.S.A., Weybridge, Surrey.

(10) Axe-shaped pebble, 3.6 in. long, with hour-glass perforation. Found by the donor at Cross, Lewis, after the removal of the peat. By Malcolm Smith, 32 Cross, Ness, Isle of Lewis.

(11) Beaker with high incurving neck, height 6.75 in., rim diam. 5.4 in., decorated with impressed lines which form narrow zones of patterns, one on the rim, five on the neck, one round the girth, and four large chevrons below that. Found in 1911 during road widening at Drowsy Brae, Shieldhill, Libberton, Lanarkshire, in a gravelly slope above the Clyde opposite Thankerton. (Nat. grid ref. 26/983387.) By Miss E. S. Dunlop, F.S.A.Scot., through Mrs I. E. H. Crome.

(12) Food-vessel of modified bowl form with girth-groove, height 4·3 in., rim diam. 5·2 in., decorated on the rim and all over the outside with zones of impressed serrated lines and half-moons with some forming "false relief." Found at Millburn, Vale of Leven, Dunbartonshire, during the making of the railway, along with "two other similar vessels containing calcined bones and teeth." By Miss A. C. D. Brown, 18 Howard Street, Kilmarnock, through Mrs I. E. H. Crome.

(13) Food-vessel, biconical with a faint narrow groove below the shoulder, height 5·35 in., rim diam. 6·3 in., decorated on the rim and the upper two-thirds of the outside with very short impressions of loosely twisted cord; found in 1874 during gravel-digging, in a cist about 300 yards N.N.E. of Glenorchard House, Baldernock, Torrance, Stirlingshire. Spindle-whorl from same field as foregoing; shallow oval stone "cup" hammered from a pebble, found half a mile N. of Glenorchard House; end-scraper of yellow flint from Craigmaddie; axe of grey-green tuff, the surface altered to a chalky white, length 5·35 in., found in a peat bog at Westloch, Eddleston, Peeblesshire. By J. Bartholomew, Glenorchard, Torrance, nr. Glasgow, through Mrs I. E. H. Crome.

(14) Food-vessel, biconical with a groove above the shoulder, height 5·1 in., rim diameter 3·25 in., rather crudely made and irregularly decorated with very degenerate "false relief" and with impressed lines, some scratched, in rows and zones above the base apparently intended to form chevrons, found in 1867 in a cist at Sandy Knowes, Wallacetown, Ayr. (Approx. map ref. 26/342218.) Bronze socketed axe 3·5 in. long, decorated with three narrow lines in relief on each face, from near Maybole, Ayrshire. By Miss Margaret G. (15) Axe-hammer or battle-axe of grey stone 4·65 in. long, with deep curved indentations top and bottom, emphasised by ornamental grooves. Found in a small cairn of stones at Scotsburn, Balnagown, Ross-shire (Pl. XX, 4). By Lady Ross of Balnagown, Balnagown Castle, Ross-shire.

(16) Relics from the excavation of a structure at Gruting, Sandsting, Shetland. (Nat. Grid Ref. N. 41/2749.) By the Most Hon. The Marquess of Zetland, through C. S. T. Calder, F.S.A.Scot.

(17) Sherds from the excavation of Dunan na Nighean, Colonsay. (See *P.S.A.S.*, LXXXIII, 232.) By the Right Hon. Lord Strathcona, through Mrs C. M. Piggott, F.S.A.Scot.

(23) Model of a Roman legionary tent of leather. By the Hunterian Museum, Glasgow University.

(24) Polished circular stone convex on each face, 2·8 in. across and 1·3 in. thick, found by the donor near North Berwick Law. By John Taylor, 19 Dundas Road, North Berwick, through J. S. Richardson, LL.D., F.S.A.Scot.

(25) Twelve casts of designs worked on the walls of caves at Wemyss, Fife. (R.C.A.M., *Inventory*, No. 541.) By the Ministry of Works.

(26) Hoard of Anglo-Saxon coins and pieces of three ornaments found at Iona Abbey (see Notes, p. 170). Acquired through the King's and Lord Treasurer's Remembrancer.

(27) Twelve coins of James VI selected from the hoard found at Castle Maol, Skye (see Notes, p. 158). Acquired through the King's and Lord Treasurer's Remembrancer.

(28) A 14th-cent. silver brooch with debased inscription, found at Crookston, Midlothian, in 1859 (Pl. XX, 3). By Miss A. B. Greig, 12 Talbot Avenue, Bournemouth, through Miss M. G. Hobson, 16 New High Street, Headington, Oxford.

(30) A small clay pot, height 1·9 in. and base diam. 1·3 in., with a pierced handle projecting from the rim and brown glazed interior. From Mull. By Donald McKechnie, Dervaig, by Tobermory, Isle of Mull.

(31) Massive iron axe-head, 7·8 in. long (type IV London Museum Medieval Catalogue), found in the garden of Marchlea House, Coldstream, Berwickshire. By William Walker, A.R.E., Marchlea House, Coldstream.

(32) Goblet with elaborate stem, of purple and clear glass, 12 in. high, *façon de Venise* probably made in Amsterdam, said to have been drunk out of by James VI at Dunfermline on setting out for London in 1603 (Pl. XX, 1). Gold ring inscribed "Given to Sr. Peter Halket by His Majesty's own hand the night he left St James's"; the bezel contains the letters "IR" surmounted by a crown, and the shoulders and under part of the bezel have blue and white enamel decoration (Pl. XX, 2). Bequeathed by Miss Madeline Halkett, Pitfirrane, Dunfermline.

(33) An iron key from Niddry Castle, West Lothian. By Miss H. S. Gardner, 12 Kinglass Avenue, Bo'ness.

(34) Glass table jug, 9.75 in. high, with a pocket for ice opening inwards below the plaited ribbon handle. Early 19th cent. By Dr J. Russell Greig, Wedderlie, 58 Kirkbrae, Edinburgh.

(35) A collection of table glassware, engraved in Alloa, formed by the donor's father; three Trade Tokens, a Communion Token, and a bodle of Charles I. By T. M. Lindsay, 16 Hillside Crescent, Edinburgh.

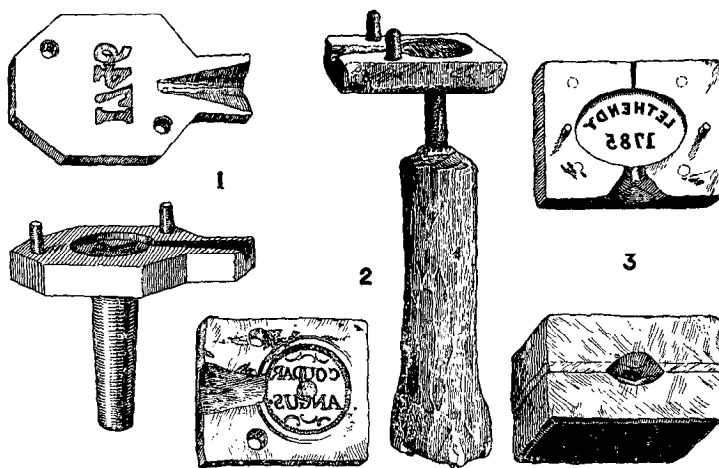


Fig. 1. Moulds and dies for making Communion Tokens (No. 49). ($\frac{1}{2}$.)

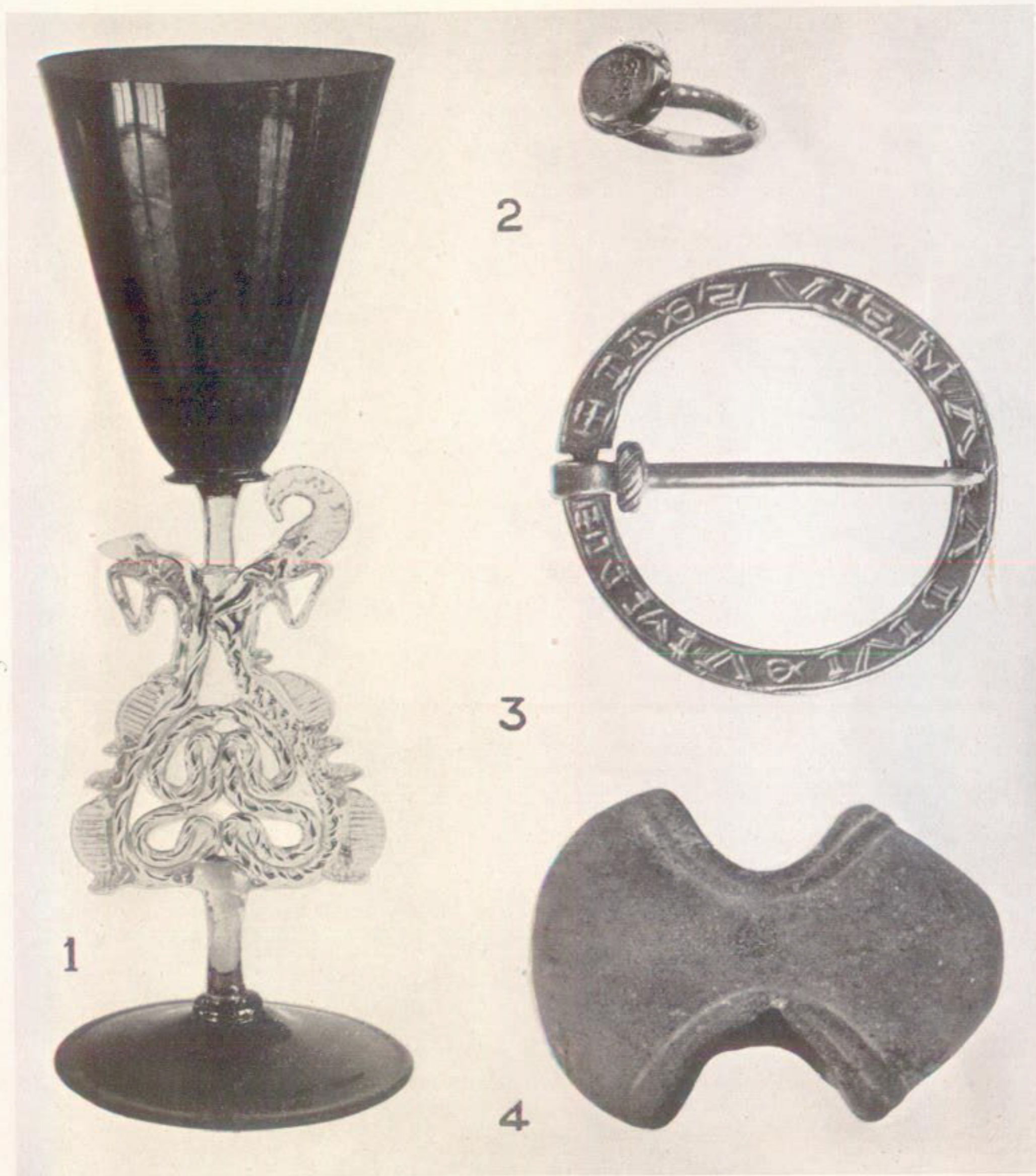
